II. Course Description:

The course aims to train the students to develop their speaking and listening skills more and more so that at the end of the course they will be able to handle specific communicative tasks. Like what had been given in Speaking 1, the focus of the course will be on practical language use. Every student will perform these tasks numerous times within the class. Extensive use will be made of audio and visual materials to train the students to listen to language used in different situations. Intonation drills will be covered so that students can produce language that approximates native language rhythms.

- 2. To familiarize students with the sound patterns such as phonemes, stress, rhythm, intonation and tone.
