Moreover, the course includes the **Renaissance** English Criticism and Sir Philip Sidney's **An Apology for Poetry** and Ben Jonson's **The Discovers** or **The Timber**, Neo–Classical Criticism – Dr. Samuel Johnson's **Preface to Shakespeare** –; and Romantic English Criticism – Wordsworth's **Preface to the Lyrical Ballads**; and finally Twentieth Century Literary Criticism: its main schools and leading figures of the period.
