II. Course Description:

This course on Reading skill is meant to develop the abilities of the students to read complex texts with technical vocabulary and to understand them effectively. It follows the prerequisite course; Reading 1 and Reading 2 to get the students more advanced practices in reading. By the end of this course, the students will be able to make more inferences, predict meanings, summarize passages, use context clues, identify topic sentences, supporting details, and concluding sentences and extract main ideas through skimming and scanning. Of course, the nature of this course and the tasks and practices will be more difficult than the previous ones given in reading 1 and 2.
